LONG-TERM STRATEGY


- Ahistorical orientation to politics leads to short-term investments and hyper-tactical methodologies
- Little to no long term infrastructure is built with the dominant approach

UNDERSTANDING VOLATILITY

- · Hope, despair, precarity underpin volatility
- The region has always been volatile

THE REGION HAS ALWAYS BEEN VOLATILE

CURRENT SWINGS ARE ACTUALLY MORE MINOR THAN 1980S OR OTHER ERAS




DIFFERENT APPROACH TO ANALYSIS

FACTORS THAT UNDERPIN VOLATILITY

- Midwest families are three times more likely to have 50% drop to family income over two years;
 15% of all Midwest families now experience this
- Hyper-segregation and sprawl have driven racial conflict and unravelling of older industrial cities
- Unions have been strategically decimated; wage gains in the Midwest are the worst in the USA
- Great Risk Shift: massive transfer of economic risk from the corporate sector and government to the fragile balance sheets of American families

DIFFERENT APPROACH TO ANALYSIS

MULTIRACIAL DEMOCRACY

- History of Black and Brown political power
- BLM epicenter: Ferguson and Minneapolis
- Latino, Native, Immigrant, Muslim voters can be margin of victory in state races

CONFLICTED WHITE VOTERS

- No "mythical moderate white voter"
- Previously anchored a progressive base
- Can be organized into the base again

BLACK & BROWN POLITICAL POWER IN THE MIDWEST

POPULATION CENTER

- More than seven million Americans identifying as Black live in the Midwest
- Second only to the South as a region

POLITICAL & ORGANIZING HISTORY

- First Black Mayor of a major city: Carl B. Stokes, 1968-1971
- Chicago Freedom Movement: 1960s
- Successful farmworker organizing campaigns in Ohio and Michigan: 1970s



By Percent White, Ohio Counties (2016-2012)






Notes: This analysis estimates Trump and Biden support by multiplying known 2020 voters from the voter file with exit poll data from CNN. As a result, it is subject to the known challenges with exit poll data, but nevertheless shows the complex multiracial electorate needed for progressives and Democrats to win statewide in the Midwest.

EPICENTER FOR CIVIL RIGHTS AND BLM


1.74M MISSING BLACK VOTERS IN 2020 ELECTION

HISPANIC VOTERS ARE GEOGRAPHICALLY DIVERSE


MISSING HISPANIC VOTERS IN 2020 ELECTION

STRATEGICIMPLICATIONS

Invest in **ORGANIZING AND INSTITUTIONS** that are fundamental to making meaningful connections in people's lives

LEAN INTO RACE AND CLASS together; dismiss false arguments that pit investments in white voters vs. Black/immigrant voters

Invest in **STATE-BASED ECOSYSTEMS** that can retain and grow capacity cycle-to-cycle both in organizing and electoral strategies

Advance strategic capacities across the Midwest that can ACCELERATE AND SUPPORT ON-THE-GROUND ORGANIZING (i.e. WMTF)
